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A message from the Board Chair

Not surprisingly, most people around the world in 2021 were concerned with the health and financial risks associated with Covid-19. The pandemic has had a profound impact on microfinance institutions (MFIs) and their clients, and access to inclusive finance – whether insurance to cover healthcare costs or loans to help businesses through lock-down – became more important than ever. InFiNe.lu and its members can be rightly proud of their role in helping vulnerable individuals, families and businesses through the crisis.

The pandemic highlighted as never before the failures of "business as usual" and the need for sustainable inclusive finance. Hundreds of millions of households and small-scale business lost income or saw revenues plummet, and the World Bank estimates that up to 115 million people have fallen back into poverty during the crisis. As we enter the post-Covid era, with just eight years to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), attention must turn to "building back better."

Inclusive financial services have to be provided responsibly and sustainably in a well regulated environment if they are to be an enabler of the SDGs. Financial inclusion goes far beyond basic products and services - it is a game-changer for accessing education, healthcare and housing. Although the SDGs do not specifically mention financial inclusion, it is hard to see how all of them will be achieved without it - but we need to see greater progress in green inclusive finance, digitalisation, and consumer protection. The combination of financial exclusion and climate change is a significant threat to achieving the SDGs. Affordable financial products and services help climate-vulnerable communities build resilience and mitigate losses. To date, most of the focus has been on scaling up global green finance through capital markets and large-scale project finance. While this remains important, greater priority must be given to inclusive insurance, loans and savings for low-income individuals and small businesses, given that they bear the brunt of climate change.

Scaling up means digitalisation. While MFIs, village savings and loan schemes and other face-to-face providers remain important, the pandemic has accelerated the growth of digital tools and platforms to reach currently financially excluded and underserved populations, and this trend will continue. According to one recent estimate, the digitalisation of inclusive finance could add US\$3.7 trillion to the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) of emerging economies within a decade.

However, consumer protection must not be sacrificed in the rush to digital. InFiNe.lu will continue to advocate for financial education, as the absence of financial or digital skills may render products irrelevant at best and harmful at worst. Not everyone has online or mobile access, and in some emerging economies, women in particular are excluded. Along with our members and partners, we will continue to promote effective legal and regulatory frameworks to protect low-income consumers.

InFiNe.lu's position at the heart of Luxembourg's inclusive finance ecosystem means we are uniquely positioned to lead and influence. Despite travel restrictions and lock-downs, 2021 saw us deliver a full programme of work, and I am confident that our global reach will continue to grow in the post-pandemic world.

Growing our network, extending our influence

With another year of lockdowns and restricted travel, social media, webinars and virtual events remained important for connecting with our members, partners and other stakeholders. While online engagement can never fully replace face-to-face networking, hybrid events such as the European Microfinance Award allow both virtual and in-person participation, and a potentially much wider audience (read a full report on the Award on page 7).

Advocacy, networking and influencing are in our DNA. In 2021 we engaged certified B-Corp consultants PatteBlanche to help drive communications through a multi-year strategic communication plan, enabling us to align coherent and consistent messaging with our multi-annual strategic plan.

Our online and digital communications to promote both InFiNe.lu and its members took a significant step forward with the launch of the Mapping of the Luxembourg Inclusive Finance Ecosystem. For the first time, users can take an interactive journey through our members' world-wide programmes and learn about their impact (read more on page 8).

Amplifying awareness is essential – more than three-quarters of our social media posts, for example, are about members' activities, and two-thirds of all articles on our website showcased members' work. Videos and live-streamed webinars are also important for sharing knowledge and expertise among members and to reach new audiences. We continued our series Did you Know? with four new YouTube videos putting a human face on inclusive finance, and tapping into the podcast boom, our Chair Michel Maquil presented five editions of the popular Carte Blanche series on RTL Radio. We were delighted to welcome two new members, CARE Luxembourg and Handicap International (HI) Luxembourg. CARE is one of the largest humanitarian aid networks in the world, with an impressive track record reaching 6.7 million people through Village Savings and Credit Associations (VSLAs), 81 percent of whom are women. HI is also active in inclusive finance, and has helped set up microfinance and social credit programmes across Latin America, Asia and Africa.

With a total of 36 members, InFiNe.lu now reflects the full diversity of the Luxembourg inclusive finance ecosystem, bringing together private, public and civil society organisations, and we continued our membership of the influential Social Performance Task Force (SPTF) and the European Microfinance Platform (e-MFP).

Despite Covid restrictions, InFiNe.lu and its members participated in several high-profile events, including the launches of the Business Partnership Facility and the Luxembourg Sustainable Finance Initiative; Lunch & Learn events organised by ADA; the Luxembourg Cooperation Conference; LHoFT's CATAPULT: Inclusion Africa programme; the Farad Finance Forum; the Convergences World Forum in Paris; and African Microfinance Week in Rwanda, where we organised a stand showcasing the work of InFiNe members. We were also active in European Microfinance Week both as a sponsor and organiser of a discussion panel in partnership with the LHoFT.

Our participation is designed to boost awareness of InFiNe.lu and its members, as well as giving an opportunity to advocate for greater financial inclusion for poor and marginalised communities. By doing so, InFiNe.lu continued to strengthen its credibility as an influential thought leader and centre of excellence in the inclusive finance ecosystem.

2021 European Microfinance Award

12th Edition: Inclusive Finance and Health Care

Ill health is the single biggest financial risk facing poor households – both the cost of treatment itself and the long-term financial burden of a health shock.

Funded by the Luxembourg Ministry for Foreign and European Affairs – Directorate for Development Cooperation and Humanitarian Affairs, the Award winner receives €100,000, with each runner-up getting €10,000. InFiNe.lu co-organised the Award and ceremony, launching the call for applications in March 2021 in English, French and Spanish and promoting it through social and news media, as well as via partners and members – resulting in 43 entries from 32 countries.

A committee of 19 expert judges drawn from InFiNe and e-MFP members selected ten semi-finalists, from whom three went forward to the final. The Award ceremony on November 18 was hosted by broadcaster and journalist Nathalie Reuter in the presence of Her Royal Highness The Grand Duchess of Luxembourg, and the Minister for Development Cooperation and Humanitarian Affairs Franz Fayot.

WINNER Fonzoke (Haiti)

Fonzoke provides financial and nonfinancial services to support Haitians – mainly women – to lift their families out of poverty. In 2014 the Fonkoze Foundation launched Boutik Santé, a training programme which teaches microfinance clients to become 'community health entrepreneurs' conducting basic health screening, deliver health education sessions and procure health products.

"To see our work recognised by the European Microfinance Award is a huge encouragement for us," Fonkoze Foundation Executive Director Carine Roenen told the ceremony via satellite from Haiti. "When we told our community health entrepreneurs about the award they were also very proud – they enable us to provide health care to tens of thousands of children. Thank you on behalf of my colleagues!"

RUNNER-UP CRECER IFD (Bolivia)

CRECER operates village banks providing savings and loans to women and vulnerable communities in rural and periurban areas. Given that cervical cancer is the leading cause of death among Bolivian women, CRECER offers a health credit scheme to cover medical costs, and operates a cervical cancer screening treatment programme.

RUNNER-UP

Dreamlopments Ltd. (Thailand)

Dreamlopments Ltd is a non-profit social enterprise and foundation which runs two development projects for migrant workers and border communities in Thailand and Myanmar. It offers low-cost, not-for-profit health microinsurance using 28 linked health facilities via its M-FUND app – including cover for chronic, old age and pregnancy healthcare.

Our Global Reach

2021 saw the launch of the online Mapping of the Luxembourg Inclusive Finance Ecosystem in collaboration with PHB Development. Backed by more than 25 years' experience in inclusive finance, the Luxembourg Inclusive Finance Ecosystem has built its global expertise across a variety of sectors including technical assistance, green inclusive finance, microfinance investment vehicles, agricultural finance, microinsurance, impact and sustainable finance, fintech, and cybersecurity.

Based on data from 2020, extensive interviews and a qualitative survey of Luxembourg-based inclusive finance organisations, the mapping reflects the diversity of Luxembourg civil society, private and public stakeholders in inclusive finance.

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


